	Usage: My motorbike has been acting up lately; I must call the mechanic to have it checked.	
4.	add up- to seem to be reasonable, logical or true	
	Usage : My neighbour told me a story about an alien sighted on the rooftop of his house; it just did not add up.	
5.	adhere to – to act in accordance with a rule or principle	
	Usage: It is mandatory for all companies to strictly adhere to safety guidelines.	
6.	agree with – to take something as right or suitable	
	Usage: This particular ensemble does not agree with the current fashion trends.	
7.	answer for – to be responsible for something bad	
	Usage : It seems the manager has a lot to answer for as the team was knocked out of the tournament in the very first round.
